

And every day it makes our friendship STRONG!



"It's your loss," said Trixie.


"I doubt it," said Rainbow Dash.


Applejack looked at him questioningly. What did she possibly have to trade?

"But there's nothing of yours in the decorations," said Fluttershy, concerned.


"Oh, but there is!" announced Rainbow Dash. "Look around! It's a rainbow of colors, just like me! So I win!" She laughed.
